The highwayman is wanted by the king for his crimes. Tim. the ostler,		
gives away the highwayman's whereabouts and the kings men try and		
find him. They tie Bess up in the hope that he will return to rescue her.		
<u>Themes:</u> Tragedy, dilemma, romance		
Setting: The poem, set in 18th century rural England and occurs around		
the town's roads and at an inn.
